Dear Families,

This is our last newsletter for the term as we near the school holidays. Students and staff are certainly ready for a well-earned break.

Staffing update:

Congratulations to Heidi Roesler who has just been converted to permanency at Angaston after 4.5 years of fulltime continuous service. No doubt she will continue to be a positive support to the many students she works with at our school.

Megan Podolski will be taking leave for the remainder of the school year to embrace a new role outside of education. We wish her all the very best during her time away. We also farewell Lynn Beeson, another SSO who has been working with us a day per week for the last eighteen months. Lynn has been a great support to the students she has worked with and we thank her for her commitment to the school.

The Deputy Principal's tenure finishes at the end of this year. We have advertised a Deputy Principal Position for 2022 with a focus on Inclusive Teaching and Learning.

Pupil Free Day

On our Pupil Free Day we spent the morning looking at Visible Learning. Visible learning stems from 15 years of research by Professor John Hattie based on the largest analysis of what improves student learning outcomes. It means an enhanced role for teachers as they become more reflective and evaluative of their own practice.

We then focused on Learning Intentions and Success Criteria for Effective Instruction, with a focus on teacher clarity; clarity of organisation, explanation, guided practice, and assessment of student learning. Teacher clarity has a significant impact on student learning which is why teachers make the learning intentions known to students, as well as the criteria to successfully complete a given task. Many of our students are quite familiar with the terms Learning Intention and Success Criteria. We will continue to focus on these, and other visible learning strategies throughout the year to improve the impact of teaching and learning for our students.

Facilities

The admin block has now been completely painted and despite a few weeks of very strong paint fumes the end result is fantastic. The painters will be working on the middle Primary unit next to freshen up the wet area, including removing the teal and orange paint. Later in the year, once the weather improves, the yellow junior primary playground will also be painted.

Written Reports

A reminder that student reports will be sent home in sealed envelopes on the last day of term. Teachers spend a significant amount of time writing reports and sometimes, unknowingly, we use language that is unfamiliar to the reader.

After reading some of the reports there are a few words that may need to be clarified:



Subitising - the ability to instantaneously recognise the number of objects in a small group without the need to count them. An example, think of a die – we immediately recognise the number of dots without having to count each one individually. By looking at groups of items, children can start to develop an understanding of how a number is made up: for example, understanding of part-part-whole relationships helps children to separate and combine numbers and accelerates understanding of addition and subtraction.

Number sense - An understanding of number and operations together with an ability and inclination to use this in flexible ways to make mathematical judgments, to develop useful strategies for handling numbers and to communicate, process and interpret information.

Inference/Inferential/Infer meaning (reading comprehension) - making an inference involves using what you know to make a guess about what you don't know, or reading between the lines. Readers who make inferences use the clues in the text along with their own experiences to help them figure out what is not directly said, making the text personal and memorable.

Literal meaning (reading comprehension) - occurs at the surface level when a reader acknowledges what they can see and hear. The details are stated and clear for anyone to identify. Literal comprehension is often referred to as 'on the page' or 'right there' comprehension.

Coffee Morning

On Wednesday we had three parents attend the Coffee Morning. Despite the low numbers we still presented information on Wellbeing and Learning at Angaston Primary, and did not finish until 10am because of the amount of discussion, and the feedback received. It was great to have such a relaxed informal chat with parents, and listen to their perspective in relation to wellbeing and learning. This has given us a few things to think about in relation to communication for example, and connecting parents to some of the strategies/changes we are implementing. Next term we are planning to continue with the Coffee Mornings, as we see these as a good opportunity to connect parents with the school. We will also provide late afternoon/early evening information sessions on things like Kimochis, Growth Mindsets, Neuroscience etc. Thanks for the coffee and chat Nicole, Jess and Kelly.

Happy holidays everyone. Enjoy your time away from the routine of school. See you all on Monday 19th July ready for term 3.


